Reagan National

→ *Concessions Team Honored and New Eateries Open*

Airport Revenue News Magazine named Reagan National Airport among the top airports in the country in its annual "Best Concessions Awards" recognizing excellence in the airport concessions industry. → *8th Annual District of Columbia Public Schools Citywide Student Art Exhibition*

More than 300 pieces of art from students of the District of Columbia Public Schools are currently on display at Reagan National Airport. The art includes drawings, paintings, collages, and prints. The exhibit's theme "Images of Interpretation" is reflected in the works of kindergarten through 12th grade students from more than 75 schools. The exhibit runs through May 31 on the baggage claim level of Terminals B and C.

Dulles

→ *Mobile Lounge Digital Audio System*

The Airports Authority recently installed a new digital audio system in the mobile lounges, the vehicles used to transport passengers between the Main Terminal and the Concourses or directly to planes. A GPS component signals the pre-recorded audio messages to start playing when the vehicles reach a certain spot along their routes. Messages are coordinated based on the route. For example, vehicles taking passengers to the International Arrivals Building play a message reviewing U.S. Customs procedures and reminding passengers to have the appropriate paperwork ready. Another message gives information about the Smithsonian Air and Space Museum's Udvar-Hazy Center located next to Dulles Airport, and includes instructions for catching a new Virginia Regional Transit bus service from the Main Terminal to the museum. Future plans for the audio system include recording messages in multiple languages to better serve international passengers.
